

The South African Research Chair in Property Law (SARCPL) in the Faculty of Law at Stellenbosch University provides the platform for scholars who can take the development of Property Law forward in the new constitutional era. The SARCPL is a research group in Property Law that is part of the South African Research Chairs Initiative. It is sponsored by the National Department of Science and Technology and administered by the National Research Foundation.

The SARCPL has positions for the following postgraduate, full-time programmes for 2022:

- 2 LLM (2 years), 2 LLD (3 years) and 2 Postdoctoral research fellowship (2 years) with the following entry requirements:
 - The applicants should hold a recognized qualification required for registration at the Stellenbosch University for each degree respectively.
 - The successful candidate may not hold any other full-time or part-time job at the same time as the bursary and may not undertake any other work for remuneration.
 - o Good computer skills (MSWord, Internet research skills).
 - Fluent (reading, writing and speaking) English; second and third languages are an advantage.
 - The successful candidate must be able to work full-time in Stellenbosch for the duration of the programme.
 - Persons from under-represented groups (race, gender, culture or otherwise) are particularly encouraged to apply. Applications from non-citizens will also be considered.
 - The SARCPL offers the following to its members: Formal research training aimed at developing highly skilled young scholars; semi-formal seminars geared towards assisting students' understanding of Property Law and broader issues; fully funded participation at national and international Property Law conferences; and NRF and departmental bursaries.
